RE: School Meals for All Coalition Renewed Support for Free School Meals For All, and Increasing California Grown Purchasing: Appreciation for May Revision Proposals, Urge Adoption of Actions Taken by Senate and Assembly Budget Committees

Dear Governor Newsom,

We applaud the Administration's recent funding in the May Revision embracing the concept of universal school meals, as well as proposing strong investments in our school kitchens and workforce, and our state's farm-to-school program. Specifically, we support the \$150 million ongoing Proposition 98 General Fund dollars to encourage local educational agencies to participate in one of the federal universal meal provisions. This will help to expand access to subsidized school meals and help our state transition to universal meals. The May Revision also

invests in our school nutrition professionals with \$100 million in one-time Proposition 98 General Fund that will provide school kitchen infrastructure upgrades and training for staff. *These proposed investments, however, still fall short of achieving School Meals for All as the permanent policy in California.*¹

We, the undersigned 206 organizations, continue our support of the 2021 Budget Act providing urgent funding to support several policies to reduce child hunger, improve nutrition and educational outcomes, and maximize federal resources available through the Child Nutrition programs. We thank the Assembly and Senate Budget Committees for advancing aligning packages of investments to achieve School Meals for All.

We urge support by all stakeholders for these actions to provide full funding for the implementation of School Meals for All in California. These transformative changes will advance us toward a hunger-free future for our children, provide fundamental support for our essential school nutrition workforce, and bolster our critical agricultural sector.

Specifically, we ask that the 2021 Budget Act include the following provisions:

- 1. Establish a mechanism to provide free school meals for all California K-12 students. Specifically, to adopt the Senate's proposal to increase state meal reimbursement by \$54 million in the 2021-22 fiscal year and provide \$650 million in ongoing Proposition 98 funding beginning in 2022-23, to cover the costs of offering free breakfast and lunch for all students. LEAs will be required to participate in the National School Meals Programs commencing in 2022-23 and offer breakfast and lunch to all students.
- 2. Approve the May Revision proposal with amendments to increase funding to \$200 million and define "healthier" and "nutritious." The May Revision proposal would appropriate \$100 million one-time Proposition 98 General Fund to provide training for school food service workers to promote healthier and more nutritious meals, and grants for kitchen infrastructure upgrades and improvements to increase access to fresh, high quality school meals.
- 3. Approve the May Revision proposal to increase Item 6100-201-0890 by \$257,337,000 one-time Federal Trust Fund and includes provisional language for payments to child nutrition program operators. Pursuant to Section 722 of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, this program provides reimbursement to school food authorities and other program operators for declining program revenue resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 4. Approve the May Revision proposal to Fund the California Department of Food and Agriculture's Farm to School Initiative at \$30 million.

Although California produces nearly half of our country's fruits and vegetables, our kids are going hungry at alarming rates. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, over two million California children were experiencing food insecurity and struggling to receive adequate nutrition. Now, as

schools are closed and families struggle to pay bills, food insecurity in California has skyrocketed to levels never before seen. The hunger crisis is hitting communities of color the hardest, with Black and Latinx families with children reporting food insecurity twice that of white households. While the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has taken steps to allow the continued service of free school meals, this de-facto free meal service is set to expire at the end of the 2021-22 school year, taking away a critical nutritional resource from children and families as they continue to experience economic hardship.

Schools and essential nutrition service workers have proven themselves to be trusted community lifelines for students and families. The budget requests we are asking for will allow our schools to serve free meals to all students as the negative economic stresses of the pandemic continue to impact California families in the years to come.

Aside from the immediate need to reduce child hunger, a body of evidence shows that receiving proper nutrition benefits child development, behavior, ability to learn, and the creation of lifelong healthy habits. California's roughly 6.2 million K-12 students are in the midst of obtaining an education that will have monumental impacts on the rest of their lives. If funded, these budget requests will ensure that each one of them has the nutrition they need to learn and thrive — a great equalizer for all students regardless of family income.

Moreover, our schools purchasing more school food from local farmers, via increased farm to school program funding, will bolster the state's economy and support the resiliency of our California farmers. Providing grant funding is critical to support our school nutrition service workers to procure, prepare, and serve fresh, healthy California-grown foods to our children. Grant funding is vital to help meet these additional expenses and will bring several long-term benefits, including to: support California's agricultural producers, strengthen farm-to-school partnerships, improve children's health, and reduce the climate footprint of our food system.

These provisions will go a long way to prevent hunger and improve nutrition while school is in session, but we must take additional action to support low-income students when schools are not in session that are proven to be the times of greatest hunger.

If funded, these investments will reduce child hunger, improve the school academic environment, help low-income families, and provide economic and social benefits that support California farmers. For these reasons, our supporting organizations are proud to support these requests and urge investment in these critical programs in the 2021 Budget Act.

We look forward to working with the Administration and the Legislature in the coming weeks to ensure that Universal Meals, including breakfast and lunch, are included in the final budget with enough funding to make this proposal a reality without creating school meal debt for parents or deficits for schools.
